Pastor's Letter

As we prepare to celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord (Easter!) on April 4, the beginning a 7-weeklong Easter season (until Pentecost, this year on May 23), I wanted to share with you this excerpt from the latest issue of Presbyterians Today about what the resurrection means in our lives:

Two questions arise persistently for us: "How does this resurrection happen?" and "What chemical or other processes would make it happen?" These are questions of modern science. The power of asking and answering such questions is the stuff of our daily lives, vividly so in the development and discussion of COVID-19 vaccines. The problem for us is that Scripture is not interested in the "how" question.

It is, however, very interested in a different question: "Who?" Who is this, coming back to us, crossing the line between life and death so completely unexpectedly? In a moment of heart-stopping tenderness, Mary Magdalene goes to the place where she expects to find Jesus' body and finds it is not there: "She turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus" (John 20:14).

Easter, with all its questions about the resurrection, is about who Jesus is – and it is also about us and about our loved ones. One of the gifts I received while pastoring congregations was the opportunity to lead worship in funeral services. At funerals, we stand at the boundary between life and death with a directness most of us do not experience otherwise. At funerals, we stand at that boundary, looking across at death, marking the passage of one across the boundary, going on before us. Here, resurrection is no theoretical matter.

What I found there, was how little I could say to answer the "how" question – a question I think I often felt more acutely than those for whom I was caring. Gradually I realized that the question I could speak to is "Who?"

Because of Easter, we know something about who it is that we face across that boundary, who receives this one whom we accompany to the boundary, who will eventually receive you and me when our time has come to cross over.

The one who we see, when we look with the eyes of Easter, is Jesus Christ, the one who has gone before us – and a familiar face. It is a face whose shape and contours we have been coming to know as we are part of the Body of Christ, the church. It is the face of one we have praised, sung to, studied, wrestled with, worshipped, doubted, believed, wondered about, failed, ignored, and sought out. It is a face that looks like those who have loved us in ways that have embodied God's love and grace, a face that looks like those beyond the ones we know, beloved by Jesus Christ and therein part of Christ's love for us.

The question of how the resurrection occurred is valid and important. But it is not the only question. The better question to ponder is not how Jesus was resurrected, but who this Resurrected One is for us. Who is it that we face at this boundary of life and death? Easter is the affirmation that it is Jesus Christ, the one who has gone before and is present now." ~ Barry Ensign-George, Presbyterian Mission Agency coordinator of Theology & Worship and staff liaison to the Committee on Theological Education.

Jesus Christ is risen: he is risen indeed!

Mark's resurrection story is less triumphant than the other Gospel testimonies. In Mark's version, we are reminded that Easter comes to us, again and again, even if we don't know what to make of God's resurrection ways. Again and again, the sun rises. And some days, that is enough.

Tax Time is Planning Time

The deadline for filing tax returns (deferred to May 17 for 2020 taxes) has a way of focusing our attention on things financial. I have another financial issue that requires your attention that the IRS won't advise you about and, quite frankly, doesn't care much about except that it may help you minimize their share of your estate when you leave this life.

I am talking about estate planning and, more specifically, making a will. I continue to hear estimates that up to 60% of Americans do not have a will. If you are one of these, I strongly advise you to make an appointment with an attorney and have a will prepared. It could prove to be the very best gift you could give your surviving family members. In fact, if you do not make a will, the State of Ohio has determined by law how your estate will be distributed. Even if you decide that the formula the State uses is satisfactory, making a will can significantly streamline the settlement of your estate for your surviving family members.

One further item you should consider is that the State's plan for the distribution of your estate makes absolutely no consideration for any charitable gifts from your estate. Making a charitable bequest in your will can reduce any estate tax liability. But, more importantly, making a charitable bequest can help assure that causes about which you care and which you have supported during your lifetime can continue to benefit future generations. Including a charitable bequest to your church will satisfy a couple of these considerations: it will provide support for your church that can help assure future generations that the faith community that has supported you and shared your important life events will continue to be here for them; it will also make a statement to your loved ones about what is important to you.

So, as you are working through your checkbook and your receipts for last year, we also ask you to give serious consideration to planning for your ultimate accounting. And, if your church represents values that you want to see continue beyond your lifetime, consider including a bequest to the church in your will. It could be a specific amount, a percentage of your estate, or the remainder that is left after you make specific allocations to loved ones or favorite causes. In any case, making a will is a gift to your family and can give you the confidence that your estate will be distributed as you desire, not be governed by an impersonal law enacted by our legislators.
