Pastor's Letter:

In my letter this month, I want to share with you a devotional piece I submitted to the local newspaper. Do you notice any familiar themes from recent sermons in worship? I hope so!

No matter where you are from, we're glad you're our neighbor.

In one of my sermons last fall, I mentioned the tri-color Welcome Your Neighbors signs that have been popping up in communities across the nation, including here in Bluffton. Shortly thereafter, a member of the congregation placed an order for some of the signs, available for anyone to take for their own yard for a small donation to cover the cost of ordering. This idea originated in a Mennonite congregation in Virginia, yet the demand for sharing the message soon spread far beyond. According to the website for the signs, "From its beginning in a conversation on a Sunday morning, to its global reach today, the movement serves as a tangible signpost encouraging us to reach out to our neighbors, build bridges of connection, and practice hospitality through the open doors of our communities."

It is such a simple gesture to put on display in one's yard, yet it can mean so much to those who come from other places, or look different, or who primarily speak a language other than English. These "outsiders" receive mixed messages from the dominant American culture about the extent of their welcome here. So a small yard sign is a good start to demonstrating welcome, followed by friendly smiles, open conversations, and mutual invitations to share life together.

The need to show welcome in our communities is obvious; the necessity of putting basic signs of welcome in our yards shows that we have a long way to go to overcome fear of differences.

This challenge is also not unique to our time. In the Old Testament, God is repeatedly reminding the Israelites to welcome the stranger in the midst. When a foreigner resides among you in your land, do not mistreat them. The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the Lord your God. Leviticus 19:33-34 (NIV). Our own experiences of being outsiders should add to our compassion for those in similar circumstances.

In the New Testament, Jesus encounters this fear of the other when he calls people to be his first disciples. In the Gospel of John, Philip tells his friend Nathaniel that the long awaited Messiah has been found: Jesus son of Joseph from Nazareth. Knowing nothing else about Jesus at this point, Nathanael scoffs, *Can anything good come out of Nazareth?* Though he says this only to one person, he might as well be saying it about everyone from there. When we casually toss around the names of other places in the world, we may also be guilty of such thinking, as least subconsciously. Even the president of our country recently made degrading statements toward entire groups of people based on their country of origin. Can anything good come from those _____ countries?

How is it that love for our own people/country/etc. is so often coupled with a fear or hatred directed toward anyone outside of our group? Our fear of the other usually has to do with our lack of knowledge. We are afraid because we cannot see who they really are. They cannot see who we really are. When Philip responds to Nathanael's rude comment, he does not reciprocate with an insult about Nathanael's background. Instead, he says, *Come and see*. Nathanael is given an opportunity to come close, to get to know Jesus as a real person, who will no longer be a stranger, but a friend.

If only we could see that in the end, it is not about "us" against "them." We are all God's children, no matter where we are from. We are all one family. How pleasing it must be for God when we make an effort to turn strangers into friends, to give and receive welcome without fear of those who are different. *No matter where you are from, we're glad you're our neighbor.*

The Christian Calendar: Transfiguration, Ash Wednesday, and Lent

On the calendar of the Christian year, we have come through the seasons of Advent and Christmas, and are back in "Ordinary Time" for just a few weeks until the season of Lent.

The Transfiguration of the Lord is Sunday, February 11. The Sunday immediately prior to Ash Wednesday is an appropriate time to look at the story of Jesus being "transfigured" up upon a mountain (Mark 9:2-10), because this event marked a transition in Jesus' ministry: from this point on, he began his final journey to Jerusalem. In celebrating this Sunday, we rejoice in the divine majesty of Christ, whose glory shone even when confronted with the prospect of the cross.

And then we mark the beginning of the season of Lent with Ash Wednesday, which falls on February 14 this year. This day gets its name from the fact that ashes are a symbol in the Bible for reflecting on our behavior and repenting of the things we have done wrong (e.g. Jonah 3:6, Matthew 11:21). Join us on **February 14 at 7:00 PM** for an **Ash Wednesday** devotional service during which we will prepare our hearts and minds to reflect on the coming season, receive the symbol of the ashes, and partake in the sacrament of communion. Let us gather in reflection as we begin our Lenten focus, renew our faith promises, and share the Lord's Supper.

The whole season of **Lent** is a period of 40 days, occurring this year February 14 through March 31. Sundays are not included in the count, as Sunday is a day of resurrection. Its name is derived from the Middle English "lente," which means "springtime." In the early church, Lent was a time for people who wanted to become members to study, pray, fast, and be examined, in order to join the church Easter morning. Later, the season developed into a time for all Christians to prepare themselves for Holy Week, through confession, repentance, and rededicating themselves to Christ.



Highlights of January Session Meeting

- Pastor Karol, Cindy, and Lori met with new deacon Tanya Best for examination prior to ordination. Ordination/Installation of Elders/Deacons will be January 14.
- Light bulb in choir loft replaced. Replaced one bulb in motion detector light – still not working consistently – will need to be checked. Repaired latch on restroom door. Sprayed for ants in the women's restroom.
- Approved serving Communion on first Sunday of each month and Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday.
- Following reorganizational items were addressed - Elected Lori Schmidt as Clerk. Approved Darin Leugers as Treasurer for 2018. Agreed to continue meeting on the second Thursday at 7:00 PM - no stated meeting in July. Approved Cindy Gillen and Tom Edwards as Co-chairs for Nominating Committee. Elected Lori Schmidt as Presbytery Commissioner. Approved that the Composition of 2018 Session includes four males and five females which is representative of our congregation in terms of age/ gender. Approved nominating the following elders to the congregation to serve as Officers of the Corporation – President – Tenna Rhonemus, Treasurer - Cindy Gillen, and Secretary -Lynda Best.

- Pastor Karol made 7 pastoral care visits plus 5 home communion visits. Congregation activities include: committee meetings, Bluffton Community Meal, Claralice Circle, and hosted College/Young Adult Gathering at the manse with 12 attending (gathering well received and will try to meet couple of times a year), worship services, and Christmas Eve. Pastor Karol has agreed to be on the Worship Planning Team for Presbytery meetings. Community activities include: meeting with 3 local pastors, hosting BAMA meeting, Bluffton Icon article, attended Mennonite Memorial Home worship service in preparation for leading worship soon (have agreed to be worship leader one time each quarter), and attended Allen County Clergy Fellowship meeting. Will be participating in BAMA's pulpit exchange on January 21 – she will preach at English Lutheran and Rev. Kevin Mohr will be preaching at our church. One of goals for 2018 is to spend time with each individual/family within congregation.
- Dick McGarrity will meet with village administrator and ask that we be added to insurance when people contact the village to request/ given permission to use the alley. Thanks to Lynda for selling these items on Bluffton Online Garage Sale pulpit chair (\$65) and pot rack (\$25). With pending snowstorm, village officials decided to take down Blaze of Lights display early. Mayor Rich Johnson has met with Lynda to discuss project for next year.
- Agreed to have Officers' Retreat on Saturday, February 10 from 9:00 AM to 12:00 PM in the church basement.


