## **Pastor's Letter**

The Presbyterian Church (USA) 225<sup>th</sup> General Assembly ("GA") will take place June 18 – July 9, 2022 with committee sessions in Louisville, KY and plenary sessions online.

The description from the GA website ([ga-pcusa.org](http://ga-pcusa.org)) reads in part: "This first hybrid assembly will be a time for worship, innovation, and a new vision for the PC(USA). Every voice must be heard in this time of transition in the life of the church."

### **WHAT IS IT AND WHAT DOES IT DO?**

The General Assembly consists of commissioners elected by presbyteries. Half of the commissioners will be ruling elders, half will be teaching elders (Ministers of Word and Sacrament).

Few will ever have been commissioners to the General Assembly before, but most will have served in one of the other governing bodies of our church: the session, which provides care and oversight of a local congregation; the presbytery, which provides care and oversight of a group of congregations; or the synod, which provides care and oversight of several presbyteries.

The General Assembly reviews the work of synods, resolves controversies in the church, is responsible for matters of common concern for the whole church, and serves as a symbol of unity for the church.

The General Assembly has several specific responsibilities outlined in the Book of Order. The assembly seeks to protect our church from errors in faith and practice, and it is responsible for assuring that the expression of our theology remains true to the biblical standards in our historic confessions. The General Assembly presents a witness for truth and justice in our local communities and in the world community. It sets priorities for the church and establishes relationships with other churches or ecumenical bodies.

### **HOW DOES IT WORK?**

First, reports and recommendations come from the various arms of the Presbyterian Mission Agency and the Office of the General Assembly.

The Office of the General Assembly, headed by the Stated Clerk, is the ecclesiastical arm of the church. The Stated Clerk and their staff work to ensure that

the Presbyterian Church maintains itself as a church. The Office of the General Assembly carries out all constitutional, and most ecumenical functions at the General Assembly.

Mission programs are carried out by the Presbyterian Mission Agency which supervises the work directed to be done by the General Assembly and can make certain decisions on behalf of the Assembly.

Overtures from synods and presbyteries are the second source of General Assembly business. These governing bodies use Overtures to bring recommendations and matters of concern before the whole church.

Commissioners Resolutions are a third source of General Assembly business. As a commissioner, one is entitled to sign two resolutions which will come before the whole assembly.

The meeting begins with an orientation; then the plenary, or whole General Assembly, meets together to elect a Moderator and Vice Moderator or Co-Moderators from among the commissioners assembled. The Moderators preside over the plenary meetings for the rest of the week.

Once the Moderators are elected, the assembly breaks up into assembly committees to consider particular kinds of business. Each committee is responsible for considering a number of items and reporting back to the General Assembly on completed actions or their recommendations.

The combined insights of all those on assembly committees become the recommendations to the whole assembly. If they are approved, they guide the church in the years to come.

Our GA commissioners from Maumee Valley Presbytery are Mary Beth McCandless, TEC, Montpelier, West Eagle Creek/West Bethesda and Lance Weismann, REC, Ottawa. Please keep them and all the GA commissioners and other participants in your prayers in the coming weeks.

## Gun Violence Awareness

National Gun Violence Awareness Day is June 3. On the first Friday of June, faith and nonfaith ministries, organizations and grassroots groups dedicate themselves to action against gun violence, most obviously by wearing orange that day.

The PC(USA) and its predecessor bodies have addressed gun violence through the actions of many General Assemblies in the last fifty years. Beginning in the late 1960's, in response to the assassinations of public leaders, the General Assembly called for "...control [of] the sale and possession of firearms of all kinds." Similar resolutions were passed again in 1976, 1988, 1990, 1991, 1996 and 1998.

Each resolution reflected a sense of moral urgency in response to rising gun violence and the cultural trends that contributed to it. These resolutions have called on the church to be involved in education and advocacy at the federal, state, and community level to prevent gun violence. In 1991 and 1996, these resolutions were backed up with strong educational curricula, as well as comprehensive strategies for advocacy.

In 2008 the General Assembly recommended that churches should take seriously the pastoral implications of caring for members of our community who have experienced the pain of gun violence, advocate for legislation that would increase the safety and well-being of communities in relation to the presence of guns and conduct a national study on gun violence. From this recommendation, a gun violence prevention task force of ten people was formed under the auspices of the Advisory Committee on Social Witness Policy.

The task force worked tirelessly over the next two years and produced a comprehensive study of contemporary gun violence in the United States, complete with recommendations for the church as to how to address this critical issue. This study was unanimously approved by the 219th General Assembly.

## HIGHLIGHTS OF MAY SESSION MEETING



- Approved to purchase all-inclusive Bose portable sound system from Sweetwater Music (for Gazebo), using money from 2017 Richard Evans Bequest.
- Approved request from BAMA for 2-4 Outdoor Summer Concerts in the gazebo – dates/acts TBD with food donations for BCAP provided dates are available on church calendar. Concern raised at BAMA about the impact of the multitude of thin blue line flags (meant to support the family and colleagues of the officer recently killed) on persons of color in the community – feelings of unwelcome and lack of safety, given that the symbol has also become associated with extremist groups with racist ideologies; consider how we as a community can be more actively welcoming to all people. Session discussed this item and felt we could be welcoming to all by having our digital sign say “All are Welcome” when service information is posted.
- Landscape at the back corner of the church (by the power lines) is being changed so that it will be easier for John to mow around. Started working on the weeds and plan to do a little “cleaning up” of the gardens around the church.

Discussed three quotes for replacing the windows at the manse. Approved to purchase white/white slider replacement windows from Thermal Guard with money to come from Triplett Fund. Presently booking in November.

With recent storm, the church basement carpet was flooded...again. Lynda Best brought her carpet cleaner in and sucked up the excess water.

- The 2021 financial reports and controls were reviewed/audited by Ohio Northern University Auditing class students. An exit meeting was held and a final report was issued on April 26.

Thank you to session for providing additional leave time in April and May along with vacation days May 23-26. Approved vacation request of June 1- 4 (2 workdays).

- Approved hiring Laura Irwin as Faith Formation Intern for 2022-2023 school year. Approved request to purchase a bassinet/pack & play for twins also serve as a changing table with Avis Marshall Memorial Fund. Will be located in the basement.

We are hosting Community Vacation Bible School July 17-21 (Sunday-Thursday). Includes bible stories, crafts, games, music, soccer skills. Opening each night will start in sanctuary to use video projection. Expect rest to be outside, but do have BFR as back up if needed because of rain. Other BAMA churches are working with us to provide leaders/volunteers.

- Beginning in June, will test having only four Communion servers rather than the current five – will continue to have one serve as rover. Approved Worship committee's request to invite and authorize all active members of BPC to participate in the rotation of communion servers.
- Decided to hold outdoor worship on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of June, July, August, and Labor Day Weekend in September. In case of inclement weather (including heat), worship would be in the sanctuary.

### Covid Relief Funds Update

During May, the Stewardship & Finance Committee applied to the IRS for an Employee Retention Credit. This credit is available to employers who retained staff during qualifying portions of 2021 who had receipts lower than the corresponding periods of 2019. Due to an IRS work backlog, it will take up to one year for our claim to be processed and paid.

With this recent (and prayerfully final) claim, BPC's Covid relief claims, as follows:

Paycheck Protection Plan received 2020  
Paycheck Protection Plan received 2021  
Employee Retention Credit to be received 2022 or 2023.

The Covid relief funds received by BPC have been used to help cover gaps between general fund collections and expenses.

### Renewing a Worship Ritual; Passing Collection Plates

Following discussions with Pastor Karol and the Worship Committee, the Stewardship & Finance Committee decided to reinstitute the Christian practice of passing offering plates during Sunday worship services beginning June 5.

**We will try a new twist!** Rather than passing plates during a separate Offertory song, the plates will be passed during the introduction to the Closing Hymn.

### Why bring back the passing of the offering plates?

The Stewardship Committee believes that passing the offering plates will allow us to be more intentional and contemplative with our offering as an act of spiritual thanksgiving and gratitude. We enthusiastically encourage members and friends to follow the spiritual giving practice most appropriate for you, whether that is gifting weekly, monthly, or as able, and whether it be online, through electronic checks, manual checks, or cash. However, the physical passing of the offering plates provides a physical chance for us to prayerfully contemplate Christian stewardship, as well as a practical opportunity to remit an offering.

**Would you please be willing to help?** We need three volunteers each Sunday to serve as offering plate ushers: one usher on each outer aisle and one in the middle aisle. ### International Mission Update- Excerpts from [PCUSA mission website](#)

Dear Friends,

As many of you are aware, Nicaragua is one of the poorest countries in the Americas and is presently facing multiple crises. Some areas are struggling with droughts, while others are still suffering from the aftermaths of hurricanes and floods, economic recession, and a public health crisis. Financial insecurity has grown since the pandemic, and unemployment has significantly increased: almost half of the population is under-employed or informally employed, especially in the rural areas.

Globally, Non-Governmental Organizations (NGO) have suffered a lot in the last couple of years. In Nicaragua, deep economic hardships and the political situation led to many of them cutting back on services during the pandemic. In addition to this, there is a new Nicaraguan fiscal transparency law requiring any individual or organization that provides information in any form to the public, and that also receives funds from abroad, to register as a foreign agent, under the penalty of sanctions.

CEPAD is one of the few remaining NGO’s that is still open and legally functioning in Nicaragua, and it is also one of the oldest. This year CEPAD is honoring its 50th Anniversary of existence with a year-long celebration. Since its beginning, CEPAD has focused on attending to the needs of the people of Nicaragua and the advancement of communities. With programs in agriculture, education, environment, family, and clean water, helping to start small scale farming projects such as community gardens and family gardens, providing small loans and much more. CEPAD also understands the importance of development programs that build the community from the inside. Peaceful and strong family structures and united communities are central in Nicaragua and some of the main areas of CEPAD’s work.
