Pastor's Letter

The month of March is said to come "in like a lion and out like a lamb." It's a gradual time of transition between seasons, though certainly not an exact way to predict changes in the weather.

This year, that saying feels like it has a bit more meaning to it. We begin March in the middle of Lent, a period of time which recalls Jesus' 40 days of temptation in the wilderness, surrounded as he was by lions and other wild beats, even while angels waited on him. We continue our daily and weekly task to reflect on our relationship with God and one another, to see how we can avoid unnecessary temptations that distract us from our Creator.

During holy week, which falls the final week of March this year, we remember the last week of the life of our Savior, Jesus, from his glorious entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, to the last supper with his disciples on Maundy Thursday, and the crucifixion on Good Friday. Jesus' willingness to die on a cross leads us to the metaphor of Christ as a lamb, an innocent sacrifice taking the place of the sins of others. So March goes out with the lamb of God being taken down from the cross to lay in wait in the empty tomb. And finally, on the first of April – no joke – comes the surprising joy of resurrection on Easter morning.

No matter the weather, let us come together to worship the one who leads us through the murky shadows to the clear light of Sunday morning.

New Beginnings

"God's Garden"

"God's Garden" By Robert Frost

"God made a beauteous garden With lovely flowers strown, But one straight, narrow pathway That was not overgrown.
And to this beauteous garden He brought mankind to live, And said "To you, my children, These lovely flowers I give. Prune ye my vines and fig trees, With care my flowers tend, But keep the pathway open Your home is at the end."

This beautiful poem was written by Robert Frost. It describes a special relationship between God, nature and us, the children God loves. God created the world, "God's Garden", for us to live in and enjoy, but it is not our final destination.

But while we are here we have been given a special role in "God's Garden". We are to be caretakers. We are to tend the flowers and trees, pruning and shaping their growth. We have also been charged with keeping the pathway to our "Home" with God open.

With those ideas in mind the New Beginnings Team would like to pose two questions to the congregation. Are we caring for the piece of "God's Garden" we have been given to the best of our abilities? And are we keeping the pathway to "Home" open for all of God's children?

We have a beautiful part of "God's Garden" right outside these walls. And though it is well maintained by earthly standards, we wonder if we could be "pruning and shaping" it in ways that serve God's purpose better.

Our green space has been described as the "Presbyterian Park", "The Place with the Christmas Lights", and most recently "The Town Square". But what might that space become if we thought of it as "God's Garden" and treated it as a pathway "Home"?

The New Beginnings Team would like to ask those people in our Faith Family who are interested in exploring these ideas to form a task force. If you feel called to join the conversation please reach out to a member of the New Beginnings team: Ryan Brauen, Dick McGarrity, Lin Rumer, Diane Winebar or Tenna Rhonemus. This task force will explore ideas and work to discern God's purpose for the piece of "God's Garden" that has been placed in our care. Then they will present their findings to the rest of the congregation to determine the best way forward.

We feel we have been given a special opportunity and obligation, in this place and this time, to serve as God's caretakers while helping everyone discover the pathway "Home". This is about more than what we choose to do with the yard. It is about what we are doing with our life as a Faith Family. May the words from James 1:21 serve as a blessing to our work.

In simple humility, let our gardener God, landscape you with the Word, making a salvation-garden of your life. James 1: ~21 (The Message)

In addition to the money raised from the chili tastings and concessions, food and personal items were donated to restock the Food Pantry.
