Pastor's Letter

In case you missed it, here is a partial summary of our life together over the past year, adapted from my 2020 Annual Pastor's Report:

Almost a full year ago, in mid-March 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic interrupted every aspect of life, including the life of this congregation. But it did not stop us. We never missed a week of worship, even if that worship was prerecorded, livestreamed, printed and mailed, or some combination of the above. We have reached many more new people (and some familiar people more consistently) through our online presence than ever before.

I am grateful for the many ways our members joined me in preparing these services, especially those who were willing to record liturgy and music. I am proud of our committees for learning how to continue the work of ministry using Zoom technology as a way of including more people without the risk of being in person. We have been especially mindful of those who are most isolated during the pandemic: our older members who live alone or in care facilities, whose circumstances make them less able to create meaningful connections with others.

The COVID-19 pandemic was not the only news of the year; we also struggled together through difficult times of unrest in this country due to racial injustice and a divisive election season. We are constantly challenged to see and serve Christ in everyone, not just people who look or think like we do. Following Christ in a broken and fearful world is not simple; this year has reminded us just how important it is that we are present to support and challenge one another in learning how our faith calls us to live every aspect of our lives.

In this season with the pandemic still hanging heavy over our lives, we need a reminder of just how important our health is. While we need to eat our "fruits and veggies" and stay hydrated and well-rested to ward off physical ailments, we also need to fortify ourselves with the "fruit of the spirit" – "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." May we bear this fruit in each aspect of our mission and ministry, as individual disciples and as a united body of Christ.

Lent



In Lent, we're reminded that, again and again, suffering and brokenness find us. We doubt again, we lament again, we mess up again. And yet, in the midst of the motion blur chaos of our lives, God offers a sacred refrain: "I choose you, I love you, I will lead you to repair." Again and again, God breaks the cycle and offers us a new way forward. We need the 40 days because this season shapes us into more faithful disciples. Join us this Lent as again and again, we bring all of who we are to God and trust that God will meet us, time and again, along the way.

2nd Sunday in Lent



Mark 8:31-9:8 | Psalm 22:23-31

Like the disciples, we are often stuck in the pattern of messing up over and over again. We cling to power, we climb the ladder, we memorialize Christ's teachings rather than embodying them. However, we can't be trapped by shame, guilt, ignorance, or inaction. Humility is required for transformation. Again and again, we are called to listen – to God and to others.

3rd Sunday in Lent



John 2:13-22 | 1 Corinthians 1:18-25

According to John, Jesus begins his ministry by showing more than telling. In the temple, Jesus disrupts and overturns the systems of corruption and profiteering taking place, but ultimately points us to the promise of restoration. Paul reminds the Corinthians (and us) that God's wisdom is more expansive than we can imagine. We are shown the way, even if God's "way" feels foolish, countercultural, disruptive, or uncomfortable.

4th Sunday in Lent



John 3:14-21 | Ephesians 2:1-10

After inviting Nicodemus to be born anew, Jesus tells him in John 3 that God so loved the world that God sent his son to restore it. Therefore, when we read John 3:16, we remember that Jesus is speaking in metaphor and poetry. Ultimately, love is where God begins and ends. This love, like grace, is a gift we do nothing to deserve. Again and again, love is our refrain. Before we act, think, or believe, can love be first for us too?

5th Sunday in Lent



John 12:20-33 | Jeremiah 31:31-34

We desire for God to write on our hearts so that God's law can re-shape and re-form us from the inside out. Reformation is a journey of letting the old fall away for something new to emerge, of returning to God's words over and over, of being drawn into the heart of God. This is the process of justification and sanctification; transformation must be internal and communal.

Palm Sunday



John 12:1-19

On Palm Sunday, we remember that Jesus' entry into Jerusalem was not a risk-free, palm party. It was a protest against those in power, a parade to prepare the way for a different kind of king, all happening with plots to kill Lazarus (and Jesus) building in the background. We're reminded that the crowds were brave to show up that day, and that Jesus drew on courage to face his journey to the cross. Courage is deep within us; we often find it when we most need it, when everything else has been stripped away.

Congregational Meeting Called for February 28

Highlights of February Session Meeting



• Clerk participated in two MVP Leadership Zoom calls. Approved calling Congregational Meeting on Sunday, Feb. 28 on Zoom following worship service on Facebook – called for purpose of voting on the proposed Gazebo project shared at Annual Meeting. Approved allowing Laura From's Girl Scout Troop to sell Girl Scout cookies on church sidewalk (using Covid-19 mitigation procedures) on Feb. 20 and 27 for two hours.

- Approved request from West Central Ohio Land Conservancy Board (9-10) members to meet in church basement 4th Thursday of odd months at 7:00 PM (Chad Carroll is on the board). Would be able to use facilities when Allen County is at green/yellow/orange level.
- Pastoral Care: 28 calls and 8 cards sent.
 Congregational Activities: Worship;
 Announcements/Prayers Email; Facebook Posts;
 Adult Faith Formation Zoom, Claralice Circle Zoom, Supervision Meetings with Faith

Community Engagement Activities: Bluffton Community Preschool Board Meeting, BAMA Meeting – ongoing BAMA Mission Outreach to local front-line workers, and BAMA Bluffton News Devotional.

Presbytery/Greater Church: Conduct and edit video interview to promote Commissioned Ruling Elder program, New Pastors' Group - Zoom, Discipleship Commission - Zoom, Commissioned Ruling Elder Team - Zoom, Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary Alum Board Exec Meeting - Zoom, Ottawa PC Annual Congregational Meeting and Session meeting Zoom (Moderator), MVP Leaders Space for Grace - Zoom, and Maumee Valley Presbytery Meeting – Zoom.

Approved Continuing Education Request: April 17-20, 26-28 including Sunday April 18 (will attend virtual Clergy Clinic in Family Emotional Process 3 of 3).

Approved Vacation Request: Sunday, May 30.

Gazebo task force (Lynda Best, Linda Sycks, Mike Rhonemus, Dick/Jayne McGarrity, and Tom/Marilyn Edwards) suggests these options: floor color - gray/shingles color - colonial slate to match church shingles, seating - removable seats so full space can be utilized when needed, surface of ramp - poured concrete as longer lasting, smoother than pavers, electrical - 8 outlets - one per column - easier than adding later, landscaping - interest in low maintenance - e.g. knockout roses.

- Maumee Valley Presbytery met on February 16 -Zoom. Because Synod is in process of restructuring, they did not spend all their mission money last year and chose to return \$8,000 to each presbytery as a gift. MVP decided that they will use this gift to help all our churches and keep MVP share of Per Capita for 2022 the same as this year. Synod has created following Lenten services available for churches to use – Ash Wednesday, Sunday during Lent (created by MVP), Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Sunday after Easter. Previous ones were well received with over 1,000 viewers. Welcomed Cathy Johnson as Interim at Toledo Christ and Carol Pierson as Interim at Bryan. First reading of MVP Leave Policy (Medical, New Parent, Bereavement, Family Leave, Military Leave) with voting to come later after churches have shared with sessions for input. New Board of Pensions temporary disability policy allows clergy to receive 60% of effective salary after being off for two weeks. Proposed MVP policy would have church cover initial two weeks of salary, 40% balance of effective salary, pulpit supply, and moderator of session expenses. Mission Committee is offering grants up to \$1,000 to churches for Matthew 25 projects.
- Hot water heater at church was leaking and replaced by M + R. Due to the electrical modifications for the digital sign, and the planned removal of the blaze lighting from church power, there is now 40 amps available for the gazebo at a relatively low cost. Additional power, if necessary, could also be pulled from the disconnect on the west side of the church. Church sign update - Concrete pad (to support faux bricks) and poles (to support sign) have been installed. Sign installation scheduled for Feb 25-26, but may be delayed by slow curing of concrete due to low temperatures. Electric service has been updated. Plan to remove excess dirt on pile at manse and seed in the spring. Church basement CO detector behind water heater replaced. Church parking sign reinstalled. Potential/new projects: electric outlet for alley, water for alley or long hose, stained glass windows - frames may need to be painted, fluorescent light in manse basement, general church yard repairs - after sign installation and Gazebo construction (if installed in 2021), consider lock for basement door - possibly

- electronic lock, alley back door install bottom seal, manse foundation inspection and proposal, manse deck issues lack of central support, lower corner support, lower support at steps, shore up step support, manse side windows painted shut (cut open with box cutters), and manse windows quotes for replacement for future planning purposes.
- Lima Rescue Mission Pizza Night is covered for February and March for servers and pizza.
 Bluffton Community Assistance - will be issuing gift cards to families again due to strong community support. Frontline Project - Pastor Karol reported that BAMA churches are interested and most have made a financial commitment - to date \$2,000 collected. Blankets were delivered to Family Promise and they were very grateful. Grace & Gratitude collected \$165.
- Recorded services for online viewing: recording sound has improved after camera adjustments made, camera will be set up closer to the chancel to help with video focus, agreed to limit hymn verses to 2 or 3, camera techs will be asked to focus on hymn, lyrics shown on the screen above the organ for those who like to sing at home.
- Insurance (property and officers' liability) was renewed with Church Mutual for 2021. Approved applying for second round Paycheck Protection Program loan of XXXXX. Procedure is for Citizens National Bank (CNB) to review and submit to the Small Business Administration (SBA). If all proceeds as planned and we are approved to receive the loan proceeds, then will incur eligible expenses (primarily ongoing wages) under the program that exceed the loan amount. Then we will apply for loan forgiveness and have no need to pay back the loan following approval of the forgiveness application. The second-round loan of XXXXX is a little higher than our firstround award of XXXXX. 2020 audit with the ONU students kicked into the active review stage on February 2 and is going well. Exit meeting is scheduled for April 22. Village of Bluffton Cultural Affairs Committee has been invoiced for \$82.02 for reimbursement of electricity for the Blaze of Lights. Under the previously approved church investment plan, we are making a series of planned deposits for investment in our Vanguard account.

Approved the following motion: On February 18, 2021, the Session of Bluffton Presbyterian Church authorizes Julia Szabo, Richard McGarrity, and Clair Winebar to act on behalf of Bluffton Presbyterian Church to signed documents related to Vanguard mutual fund accounts and Vanguard Brokerage Accounts owned by the church, invest the assets of the church, obtain account information and give instructions for the purchase, sale, exchange, or transfer of securities. Further, Session authorizes Clair Winebar to establish online access to the church's account. The authorized individuals are acting in their capacity as Treasurer (Julia Szabo), President of the Bluffton Presbyterian Church corporation (Richard McGarrity), and Stewardship and Finance Elder (Clair Winebar).


- Receive a packet with items needed for a 7-week series.

Proposal for Gazebo

We'd like to give you information concerning a proposal made to Session which includes input from Faith Formation, Buildings & Grounds, and Stewardship committees. It is essentially an update of a proposal made by the 2015 New Beginnings Committee which consisted of Ryan Brauen, Dave Sycks, Jana McVetta, Tenna Rhonemus, Lin Rumer, Diane Winebar, and Dave Good. There was a gazebo on the lawn many years ago, although we haven't been able to find a photograph. Mary Barnett remembered concerts there and many people have stories about the old gazebo.

We believe the project would be consistent with the church's objective of community outreach. Possible uses would be to provide a place for:

- Rest, meditation, and reflection for passersby.
- BPC events such as Sunday services, Faith Formation activities, fellowship, weddings, funerals, fundraisers.
- Community events such as weddings, showers, birthdays, anniversaries, and fundraising.
- Musical and dramatic performances by church, high school, university, and community groups.
- Relaxation by parents and care givers while kids are playing.
- Community programs such as Blaze of Lights, Bluffton in Bloom.
- Enhancing the small-town quaintness and ambiance of Village.

BPC Gazebo Fact Sheet

1. **Appearance:** The proposal is for a white, 20' by 20' octagon-shaped, Victorian style gazebo. The area would be just under 400 square feet and the floor would be two feet above the ground. Dave Sycks believes that this size would accommodate all the high school musical groups except show choir (although the band would be a squeeze.) The size is the same as the gazebo in Ottawa's Water Works Park and is about 2½ times the size

- of the one in Bluffton's Johnny Appleseed Park. The material would polyvinyl-covered pine. The manufacturer, LuxCraft of Sugar Creek, OH, an Amish company, describes it as virtually maintenance-free, although it would need power washing every few years. It would be of commercial quality with a shingle roof. It would include an electrical connection to the church, but we would need to distribute power to specified electrical fixtures. The following photo from the LuxCraft catalog of an octagonal gazebo gives an idea of its appearance.
- 2. **Location:** The proposal is that the gazebo would be located approximately 40' out from the entrance to the basement. White flags on the lawn indicate this position, which allows for good visibility from both Cherry and Main Streets while being far enough from all streets to minimize traffic noise. It would also leave a large part of the lawn open so that people watching an event could spread blankets or use lawn chairs.
- 3. Cost and Design Details: Cost estimates indicate that the total project would not exceed the XXXXX which will remain in the Barnett beguest after the final payment for the electronic sign. This figure includes electrical distribution and fixtures, landscaping, and permits. Because the floor of the gazebo would be 2' above grade, a ramp would be needed for people with disabilities. The ramp would run between the gazebo and the sidewalk in front of the basement entrance. Rather than use a manufactured ramp, we plan to use a ramp created by raising the elevation of the ground gradually between the sidewalk and the gazebo. The stairs to the gazebo, which would face the parking lot, would be wider than normal, resembling risers. This would enable them to be used by a choir, bridesmaids, or anyone "spilling over" from the gazebo. Tom Edwards has suggested that we seek out volunteer labor to assist with electrical and landscaping. For example, Wendell Badertscher has indicated an interest in helping with the electrical. Dave Sycks has volunteered to help specify the lighting levels and locations for electrical outlets and fixtures.
- 1. **Timing:** We could expect the gazebo to be installed about two months after we give them a purchase order. The installation process takes about three days.



Two of the 8 sides would be open for steps (risers) and one side for handicap entry. Different roof colors are available. See Gazebo task force report in Session "Highlights of February Session Meeting" on page 4 above for suggested details on various options.
