On Loving One Another

The scene could not have been more unpromising: a low-lit room, full stomachs, and the dirty feet of a dozen men. Not exactly a situation where you'd expect one of the world's greatest lessons in loving one another to occur.

But it was here, nonetheless, in the upper room of a common house in first-century Palestine, the night before Jesus died, that we learn how to live *together* as the church. The apostle John tells us the story. Jesus washed his disciples' feet, acted out his character of humility and service. Afterward, Jesus told those gathered:

"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another."

John 13:34-35

Jesus asks that we do what he does. And this means, profoundly, that one of the ways we identify with Jesus is by caring for others in the same manner that Jesus cared. We show ourselves to be his disciple when we humble ourselves and seek the good of others at our own expense.

This is significant because we experience personal sacrifice in serving one another. It always costs *something* to seek someone else's good. It might be our time, convenience, energy, or treasure. And there will be instances when it feels like we're not getting any encouraging return on our investments. In these moments, because of Jesus's example, we know it doesn't mean we turn and run, but instead hold on and keep going. When serving others becomes difficult, we shouldn't necessarily serve less, but perhaps more. And with an attitude adjustment. In doing that, we go deeper with Jesus.

The COVID-19 pandemic has caused the Church to re-examine the way she serves the community of believers. Churches have felt the pain of extended periods of closure and times of togetherness. Now they're experiencing reduced attendance and are struggling to stay connected. Church leaders are stressed with trying to figure out the right course to chart in uncertain times.

Add to that our own particular situation here at BPC – a pastor on an extended leave. For the most joyous and necessary of reasons, of course, but still a new course to chart.

The catalyst behind our serving one another is *our* love for one another. The church loves one another, sometimes even in ways deeper than flesh-and-blood family.

And that's how we live together as the church in this world: we help one another when it hurts, we get through things together, and we love one another.

- Pastor Karol's new parent leave began on February 1. Elders/Deacons will be providing majority of Pastoral Care. Chris Schilling is contracted for 12 hours per week for planning/ leading Worship and emergency Pastoral Care including funerals.
- Replaced battery in office clock. Met with the Village Administrator – we passed our Sanitary Compliance Inspection – new requirement. Replaced the furnace filters. SW Concrete came and removed snow around the church -January 23. SW Concrete came back for a second time – night before Jeanette's visitation/services – January 24. 
Community Markets Rebates – Save Your Receipts!

Participating in the Community Markets rebate program is super-easy – simply drop your Bluffton Community Markets receipts in the little basket attached to the bulletin board by the church office or mail them to the church. The church then gets a 1% cash rebate! It works best if you keep your receipts loose when you put them in the basket or mail them – please no staples or rubber bands.

The rebates program is a super easy way to support our church and local grocery store! There is no user account, loyalty card, or app required \odot ! Even when your receipts are from quick stops for only a couple items, they are worth turning in because the total adds up when combined with everyone.

Thank you to Darlene Hey for coordinating our Community Markets rebates program! We recently received a \$592 rebate check from Community Markets for our participation, which is now being put to good use in our 2022 general fund.

Make a Difference this Lent

One Great Hour of Sharing, in addition to supporting our neighbors in need, promotes lifestyle integrity work and environmental stewardship. Use this resource, designed in partnership with the Presbyterian Hunger Program, to inspire thoughtful practices this Lenten season.

Give up an hour of electricity on March 27.

Participate in Earth Hour by switching off all electricity at 8:30 p.m. local time in solidarity with global efforts to secure nature and our home. Even better – consider giving up Netflix during Lent and using the roughly \$28 you save in those two months to donate a family of chickens to a family facing food insecurity.

Give up bottled water.

If you spend \$1 on a 16.9-ounce bottle of water, you're effectively paying \$7.57 per gallon – 3,785 times more than you'd pay for the same amount of water from a faucet! Giving up one bottle of water every day during Lent could save you around \$60, enough to donate a sewing machine, a source of income for a person in need.

Give up food with a high carbon footprint.

Beef and cheese are two foods with a high carbon footprint. Hamburger averages \$3.95/pound. By eliminating this food once a week during Lent, you can save nearly \$25 and provide up to 10 jerry cans to help in the efficient transportation of water. Calculate your food footprint at eatlowcarbon.org.

Eliminate air travel.

Aviation contributes $\sim\!2\%$ of the world's global carbon emissions, and short flights produce a larger amount of greenhouse gas emissions per passenger compared to longer routes. The **thousands of dollars** you can save on a family vacation for four could provide a community farm bundle – including livestock, tools, and training.

Walk somewhere you would have driven.

U.S. consumption of 500 gallons of gasoline every year per driver creates as much as 10,000 pounds of carbon dioxide. By walking instead of driving, you can save roughly \$175 this Lent, enough money to support a women's empowerment project in another country.

Speak to the powerful.

Urge elected officials to support legislation making justice a priority, such as welcoming refugees. Visit capwiz.com/pcusa/home to reach out to your representative.

Set a goal of zero food waste today.

40% of U.S. food supply is wasted each year – that's 219 lbs. per person! Food waste costs the U.S. around \$218 billion per year. When 12% of American households are food insecure, reducing food waste by just 15% could provide enough sustenance to feed more than 25 million people, annually.

Switch from single-use bags to reusable bags.

The average family only recycles 15 bags a year; the rest end up in landfills or as litter. It takes 500+ years for a plastic bag to degrade in a landfill. Unfortunately, the bags don't break down completely but instead photo-degrade, becoming microplastics that absorb toxins and continue to pollute the environment.

Plant a tree.

If every one of America's 85 million gardening households planted just one young shade tree in their backyard or community, those trees would absorb more than 2 million tons of carbon pollution each year. You can also help others plant trees with the gift of a sapling set for \$30.

Drink only water today.

It takes 600 cups of water to produce a single cup of coffee, and 125 cups of water to produce a cup of tea. By giving up a cup of coffee each day of Lent, you could save roughly \$125, enough to donate an emergency food basket.
