Swimming in the BIG WAVES

Swimming in a lake requires a special attitude. In the relation to the distant shore, there is very little sense of making headway. But you keep swimming. You have to keep swimming.

But then, when the wind stiffens, the lake becomes choppy and swimming is less fun and becomes work. It becomes effort. Unless you are in the ocean and it isn't just choppy, instead there are big waves. Now the key to the big waves is you have to work with them. You can't fight them. You have to take their energy and use it. If you don't work with them – well, the water <u>will</u> win.

Well, it has been an interesting 6 months.

Making large decisions about the future. Taking steps. Dealing with bureaucracies, the board of pensions, social security administration. Then Charles had the heart attack. Then Charles and Ermil were moving into our house. And Advent and Christmas. Then a brief season of winter light through the living room windows, and evenings filled with "Jeopardy" and "the price is right" (Ermil's favorites). Then there was the 100th birthday party, a major milestone. But this entire journey and all the complications are just swimming in the lake until you meet death, from a direction you didn't anticipate. (And in some sense death is always beyond anticipation.)

Because death is **the big waves**. It is loss which is attached to things **deep** within. Things you can never fully grasp until they are flinging you around; and you are just a little swimmer in waves which are big.

So you do what you have to. You face what needs to be faced. You do what you can. And in the middle of that you continue moving. There is no way around grief and loss. You have to go through it.

Dear Bluffton, Thank you for your love and prayers through this journey. The journey filled with unexpected turns. Filled with relationships which are delight filled, and taxing. Filled with meeting the changing times, in both the light and the dark. Thank you for the notes, the cards, expressions of care, moments for a touch of the hand or a hug; thank you for the flowers. You are nothing less than the caring Spirit of God

Now I guess we will meet what comes next. My brother's bone marrow cancer, my retirement dinner. My departure. And then, in your season, your new installed pastor. In the midst of all of this, there will be the celebration of gifts, the celebration of life and faith, of the times which we share together, and there is change and loss.

Life is filled with surprises. I am glad I brought my swim suit. You share grace and peace, thank you.

Well, my thoughts have developed and our time now grows short. Here are my thoughts in sermons for the coming weeks. There are some things we should get on the table, **not because there are answers,** but because in our time **we are called to meet the questions.**

May 14 – "Bringing nature home". Some thoughts about God's intent for life. It is an abundance of life (and death) and relationship. This lesson comes from our garden, but it is about our world.

May 21 – "What Habakkuk said". Whoever heard of a sermon on Habakkuk? On the Sunday of my retirement dinner, I wanted a message which has accompanied me across my journey. It is the words of Habakkuk 3:17-18; it is a song I have sung for 56 years. It is the challenge of life, it is the context and response of faith, it is a celebration of assurance.

May 28 – "In the real world: race". Some reflections on race and relationship for the current moment and from across 7 communities and 50 years.

June 4 – "On being Presbyterian and being Bluffton". The gifts and problems of being Presbyterian, the gifts and opportunities of Bluffton.

June 11 – "Gospel and Godspeed". Gospel thoughts and good "goodbyes".

I'll see you Sunday(s)!

New Commissioned Ruling Elder Program

The Maumee Valley Presbytery and the Commissioned Ruling Elder Committee are excited to announce the creation of a new Commissioned Ruling Elder Program (formerly Lay Pastor Program) to launch this September 2017. Do you feel a call to ministry but are not able to go to seminary? Do you know of someone in your church that has the gifts of ministry? Do you want to explore how God might use you in a new way in the local church? If so, this program may be for you!

Pastor Dave has a document entitled: Vision and Scope of the CRE Program. It explains the CRE training program that begins this fall. It is a 30month program. It involves online classes with Union Seminary (<u>www.upsem.edu/pathways</u> for more information) plus a Bible Content Course, a Preaching course, and a few other locally generated courses to fill out what Union Seminary provides.

Some of the requirements to be a part of this program are: the student must be an Elder in a PCUSA church (or working toward it within a year) and the student must be endorsed by their local Session, and the student must be interviewed by the CRE committee prior to acceptance.

We are excited about launching this new training program. If you have questions contact Pastor Dave. The deadline for the completed application to be to us is June 1, 2017. Please send it to the Maumee Valley Presbytery at: 700 East Melrose Avenue, Findlay, Ohio 45840, Attention: CRE program.
